Class Presentation. Each team of 3 or 4 people will present a chapter of the textbook in one lecture period. The team mark will reflect how the team functioned as a whole, and the individual marks will be for each student's part of the presentation.

Essay. You will select a nonfiction book or other major work to read and comment on. Your essay will discuss the impact of the book upon the development of some area of psychology, and why you think this work was so influential or should have been but wasn't.

Examinations. The midterm and final examinations will consist of one essay question each designed to get you to integrate material from different parts of the course.

Computer failure is also not an acceptable excuse. Always print a draft of your assignment; then if you have a computer disaster, you can submit the draft as proof you have done your work. Then submit a clean copy of the assignment within 24 hrs.

Classroom Behaviour:

I expect students to arrive at class on time (and I will try to do the same) and not to leave during the lecture. You will need your full attention on the lecture if you are to learn anything. I usually end the lecture a few minutes early so that students who have individual questions can ask them at the end of class.
